



## You can reduce the feral cat population in Baltimore

A dumpster is no place for a kitten. But it's not uncommon to find one there—buried among the trash.

No one deserves to be thrown away—not even a homeless kitten.

Homelessness isn't just a people problem. There are 185,000 feral cats in Baltimore.

I wish I could tell you that we are close to solving the problem. But we're not.

A female cat can have 3 litters a year with an average of four or more kittens in a litter.

That's a lot of kittens with no place to call home.

But by creating a catch and release spay and neuter program, we can reduce the cat population significantly. \$35.00 will spay or neuter one cat in Baltimore. \$70 will spay or neuter two.

Can I count on you to help spay or neuter <N1>, <N2>, or even <N3> feral cats in Baltimore?

Your gift means fewer kittens will be born this year on the streets of Baltimore. Your gift means fewer cats will die agonizing deaths from starvation or trauma caused by humans.
